The City of Richmond and our Tax Increment Finance Authority continue to work to replace aging infrastructure to strengthen our local community. Below are the highlights of a few of our spring projects. The City has been able to secure Federal and State funding to assist with the cost of some of the projects.

MAIN STREET WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT

This Spring the City will be replacing the water main on Main Street from Division Road to the CN railroad tracks. The project will install a 12-inch HDPE (plastic) water main by directional drilling along Main Street under the sidewalk on the west side. The existing 8-inch cast iron water main was installed prior to 1916. By directional drilling the pipe in, disruption to traffic on Main Street will be reduced. The contractor (Superior Contracting) will still have to dig down to connect water services along with excavating at the beginning and end of the projects and to tie in existing water mains at the intersections along the way. The City was awarded up to \$943,000 in EPA grant funds from U.S. Representative Lisa McClain for the project which can be used as 80% match funds for the construction portion of the project.

OAK AND PRIESTAP STREETS RECONSTRUCTION

This spring the City awarded the contract for the reconstruction of Oak and Priestap Streets to Teltow Contracting. The project consists of replacement of the asphalt on the entire length of Priestap Street and Oak Street between Main and Division. It also includes miscellaneous curb, driveway, and sidewalk replacement, installation of 1,000 feet of 8-inch HDPE water main via directional drilling, and installation of 500 feet of 8-inch PVC sanitary sewer on Priestap. The project will also remove the abandoned railroad tracks from Oak Street. The City was awarded approximately \$200,000 from MDOT's *Transportation Economic Development Fund Program* to go toward the roadway improvements.



PARKING IMPROVEMENTS

The Richmond Tax Increment Finance Authority (TIFA) will be doing two projects in the North Business District to strengthen our business climate. The first is the repaving and improvements to the main City owned Municipal Parking lot on the west side of Main Street between Water and Monroe Streets. Teltow Contracting will be repaving the entire lot along with repositioning one of the drive entrances, replacing landscaping and creating a place for amenities to service the Social District and events held here. The second project is the demolition of the vacant house located at the southwest corner of Monroe and Forest. This area will initially be converted to greenspace for use during events held in the Social District. Eventually it may be converted to additional parking for our business community.

RICHMOND VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT CHIEF NAMED

Members of the Richmond Volunteer Fire Department held an election on Wednesday, February 19, 2025, and elected Robert Reindel to be Fire Chief for a one-year term commencing on March 1, 2025 and expiring on February 28, 2026, his first of up to three, one-year terms. City Council confirmed the Appointment at their meeting on March 3rd.



Rob joined the fire department in February 1994 and previously served as Fire Chief from 2010- 2012.

Chief Reindel's son, Drew, also serves on the RVFD.


The other officers elected were: Chief 2, Tom Garant; Chief 3, Nick Yelencich; Captain, Matt Ball; Lieutenant 1, Scott Gray; Lieutenant 2, Joel Dobbelaer; Sergeant, Steve Aiken.

The City Council, administration and the community would like to thank the outgoing Chief Rob Treend for his years of service not only as Chief the last three years, but also his 35 years spent with the Richmond Volunteer Fire Department.



RECREATIONAL VEHICLES

Summer months bring lots of sunshine and begins the season of camping & boating. Just a reminder to all residents that RV's, travel trailers, campers, boats, etc. parked at a residence must adhere to the code of ordinances for the City of Richmond. Recreational vehicles must be stored behind the front edge of the residence. See the illustration for reference (items must be stored behind the red line). It is against the City Ordinance to store a camper in your driveway in front of your house. Based on citizen complaints, Council recently updated the rules on loading and unloading recreational vehicles in your driveway. You are allowed to pack/unpack a camper in your driveway 48 hours prior to or immediately following a trip. You are only allowed to pack/unpack a boat & trailer 24 hours before/after use and never more than 48 hours in a seven-day period. RVs (both campers and boats) are never allowed to park over the sidewalk even when packing/unpacking. Violations are a municipal civil infraction, to which fines will be assessed.



WEED CUTTING

Just a reminder that all noxious weeds must be cut "at least twice a year," once on or before June 1st & again on or before September 1st, or at any other time that the height exceeds 12". Failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance result in owner being liable for the expense of the cutting of the weeds. Any costs incurred by the City to have the weeds cut will be placed on the property owner's tax bill.

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

In recognition of the National Day of Prayer, Richmond Area Pastors will be holding a prayer event in front of City Hall on: **Thursday, May 2nd 12:20 - 12:40 pm**. The public is welcome and invited to attend. The Richmond Good Old Days Festival will be sponsoring a pizza luncheon in City Hall following the ceremony for those that attend.



MEMORIAL DAY PARADE

The Good Old Days Festival and the City would like to invite local children to show their Patriotism and join this year's Memorial Day parade on Monday, May 26th! Decorate a bike, wagon, or themselves in Red, White and Blue and participate in the parade. Adults - you can get in on the FUN too! Registered golf cart owners can decorate their carts and join us.

Anyone interested in participating in this year's parade (no registration necessary) should meet at Bailey Park to line-up, starting at 9:30am. The parade will begin at 10am and will enter Main Street at Washington Street and travel south to Water Street (like the Homecoming Parade), ending at Veteran's Memorial pocket park near Maniaci's.



After the Parade, a brief ceremony will take place at the Veterans Memorial on Main Street. The block of Main Street between Monroe and Water Streets will remain closed to allow the public to gather and watch the ceremony.



BURN PERMITS

The City of Richmond Fire Department requires that you get a Burn Permit any time you are going to do an open burning.



OPEN BURNING PERMITS ARE FREE

Permits can be obtained at the Richmond Police Department or on the City website. Under the "How Do I" tab at the top of the page, under the "Apply For" column, select "Burn Permit" and then click on the underlined "Burn Permit" link and fill out the online form. Please all rules and regulations on the City website. You must be 18 years or older to obtain a burn permit. During a dry period, the Fire Department may have a ban on open burning & will not issue any permits.

- Campfires must be kept less than 3 feet in diameter & less than 3 feet in height. Fires can be ground pits, mesh grills, and/or fireplaces.
- It must be located more than 50 feet from any structure.
- Permits will be issued for 4 days.
- Residents may have a small camp or cooking fire for recreation.
- The camp fire must be attended at all times.
- The camp fire shall consist only of seasoned dry firewood and shall not emit any obnoxious odors or smoke.

There is to be no burning of leaves, grass clippings, garbage, sawn, or processed wood.

YELENCICH APPOINTED TO CITY COUNCIL

At a recent council meeting in February, Nick Yelencich was appointed to the City Council. Nick fills the seat vacated by former councilman Rob Reindel.

Nick is a lifelong resident of Richmond. Not only did he grow up here, but he and his wife also raised their family in Richmond. He has been a member of the Richmond Volunteer Fire Department since 2006, and is currently serving as an Officer of the RVFD. He is also a member of the Richmond Good Old Days Festival Committee and serves on the City of Richmond Tax Increment Finance Authority.



ANIMAL OWNERS

In accordance with Section 14 of the City's Code of Ordinance, residents are reminded that all animals that enter or remain in any public park or recreation area, public building, or any building or area which is open to the general public, **must be attached to a leash with a maximum length of eight feet**. The only exception would be for a guide dog or leader dog which is trained to assist a blind person.

Section 14 further prohibits any animal to defecate on any public thoroughfare, passageway, sidewalk, bypass, play area, park or any place where people congregate or walk, **unless the owner immediately removes all droppings and disposes of them in a sanitary method**. The cooperation of all animal owners is appreciated by the City and helps to ensure that all public areas remain nuisance free so they can be enjoyed by all residents.



Also included in Section 14 of the Ordinance is the **limit on the number of animals an owner may have; the quantity is limited to 2 adult dogs and 2 adult cats**. Any other animals must be approved by City Council prior to purchase.

YARD WASTE

**BEGINS
APRIL 7th**

- Curbside yard waste is collected on Tuesdays from April to November.
- Yard waste must be placed in yard waste bags or garbage cans (32 gallons or less).
- Garbage cans must be marked yard waste.
- Cans can be spray painted with a large "X", or "Yard Waste" stickers are available at City Hall.
- Each bag/can must be 50 lbs or less.
- A maximum of 10 bags or containers can be placed each week.



Twigs, sticks, and branches 4' or less in length can be bundled with twine. Yard waste mixed with trash will not be accepted.

RICHMOND HERITAGE FESTIVAL

RAHGS will be holding their annual Heritage Festival & Fiber Festival on Saturday, June 29th, and the continuation of the Heritage Festival & Log Cabin Day on Sunday, June 30th, 10am-4pm each day.

The Festival will take place at Historic Village & will include a demonstration of vintage farm tractors and pre-1959 stick cars, several blacksmiths will be on site, an antique sawmill and an antique shingle mill. They will host several activities for children, including a children's petting farm from the Wolcott Farm Learning Center. Along with antique games and activities to engage and educate children, including rope making, bean sorting, corn shelling, and some simple chemical experiments. 


